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For advanced BA- and MA-students who plan to spend their time abroad at Oldenburg University, we are now offering a (one or two semester) study program in the field of European Studies.

You will study at Carl von Ossietzky University, which is located in the city of Oldenburg – a very nice, safe, and green city of about 160,000 inhabitants in Germany’s Northwest. Close to the North Sea, the cities of Groningen (The Netherlands), Bremen, and Hamburg are within considerable reach.

## What is it all about?

The program can be studied either for one or for two semesters, with at least 24 CP per semester.

It incorporates modules on different developments, issues, and key aspects in European societies, economies, and cultures, both present and past. The main language of instruction is English.


According to your individual preferences, you can opt for modules in one out of two thematic clusters:

“Society, Economy, and Politics” or  
 “Languages, Cultures, and Education”

In your chosen cluster, you will have to study at least two modules per semester and acquire at least 12 CP in the first and at least 15 CP in the second semester.

Additionally, you will study an introductory module, which consists of a language course and an introductory seminar on Germany in the first (12 CP) and an advanced language course in the second semester (9 CP).

After successful completion, you will be awarded a certificate.



## What we offer

### Thematic Option 1

#### Society, Economy, and Politics

In this cluster, you will deepen your knowledge on the processes of globalization and European integration that transform the society and economy in Germany and other parts of Europe. You can choose modules from the fields of sociology, political science, economics, business & management, and law.

Course topics include e.g. climate change, financial crises, migration and demographic change, transnational regimes of trade and production, or conflicts related to nationalism and terrorism.

### Thematic Option 2

#### Languages, Cultures, and Education

In this cluster, you will explore Europe/parts of Europe as multilingual and culturally diverse regions both in contemporary and in historical settings. You can choose modules from the fields of history, literary and cultural studies, linguistics, pedagogy, and sociology.

Course topics include e.g. phenomena of multilingualism, the history and reverberations of European colonialism, Europe and/in processes of globalization, migration and forms of cultural mobilities to, from, and within Europe, or the role of (primary, secondary, tertiary) education in these highly diverse contexts.
